## Programme and Programme notes

Bernhard Crusell (1775–1838) was a Swedish-Finnish clarinetist, composer and translator,[2] "the most significant and internationally best-known Finnish-born classical composer and indeed, — the outstanding Finnish composer before Sibelius"

Johann Friedrich Fasch (1688-1758) was a contemporary of JS Bach and highly regarded by him. A prime example of Fasch's writing, the Sonata in C Major shows an intimate knowledge of the bassoon and its capabilities at the time. The sonata is in four movements in the slow-fast- slow-fast sequence typical of the Italian Baroque. The piece brilliantly exhibits the bassoon's lyrical and virtuosic capabilities

Concertino for bassoon and piano by Marcel Bitsch (1921-2011) - French composer

Born in Toulouse, Marcel Bitsch went on to study at the Paris Conservatoire before becoming a professor of counterpoint at the institution. As an exceptionally versatile composer, Bitsch has composed orchestral works, chamber works and numerous pieces and studies for wind instruments. *Concertino* is a sublime addition to the Bassoon repertoire. The diversity of musical elements included in this work for Bassoon and Piano is outstanding, creating a necessary addition to the advanced bassoonist's repertoire.
